








Conceptual diagram


4 fields of Built env+2 additional fields



Combination of CoA board by Architects Act (2000)




Combination of CoA BOARD (2004-2006) by fields

- E-Education the certain level and degree must be accredited by COA for all registered architects
- E-Experience the prove of certain continuous period of practice must be achieved, with a number of built projects * must be done by all registered architects
- <u>E-Examination</u> the interview and writing examinations** are required for new entry of all registered architects


Levels of licensure

- Entry level Amateur : only small scale design projects
- and level Regular member: medium scale design/planning projects
- 3rd level Associate: all design/planning/consultation projects
- Highest level Fellow: all design/planning/consultation projects + endorsement
- (Temporary license International architect according to APEC architects agreement)

Minimum size of regulated design and planning projects (Ministerial Regulation, 2006)


